## 1 EPIC\_Wk 5\_Conversion/Councils (313 – 499 AD)

- 2 Review: Conversion/Councils Part 1
  - Constantine II wins battle of Milvian Bridge; he sees Cross in sky, applies to shields to win battle
  - Church becomes *legalized* in Roman Empire and is at peace from *external* persecution, but *internal* persecution come from new heresy of *ARIANISM*.
  - <u>1<sup>ST</sup> Ecumenical Council of Nicaea</u> to counter heresy; drafts *The Creed* (we use every Sunday at Mass); defined Jesus was *consubstantial* (of same likeness) as God<sup>1</sup>
    - Church no longer persecuted; some turn to living in simple life of solitude (generally in Egyptian desert) to practice penance, to fast and grow closer to Christ
- 10 Arianism (cont'd): Some EASTERN bishops troubled by use of word consubstantial
- 11 Eusebius of Nicomedia<sup>2</sup> publicly supports Creed but promotes Arianism; forms bond with Constantine
- who only wants peace and unity in Empire and that includes The Church.
- 13 Caesarean-papism used to describe Constantine's meddling in Church affairs; tries to become ruler of
- 14 Church, even appoints bishops
- 15 St Athanasius (EASTERN Bishop): ordered by Constantine to accept Arianism as a legal faith and
- 16 Athanasius refuses; becomes Bishop of Alexandria (328) for 45 years but Eusebius of Nicomedia
- orchestrates his exile 4 times (25 yrs.) in Gaul (France), Holy Land, Rome to try to keep him from
- 18 defending the faith

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- 19 **Council of Tyre** (not ecumenical council but local counsel; pope did not approve): Purpose was to trap
- 20 Athanasius and dispose of him; false accusations, Athanasius goes into exile; most of EASTERN bishops
- 21 remain with Arianism
  - 336 AD: Arias dies in bathroom in Constantinople before meeting with Emperor Constantine
- 23 337 AD: Emperor Constantine dies on Pentecost Sunday (Eusibius of Nicomedia had baptized him)
- 24 Constantine's intentions were good but approached it from political rule of the Church and got involved
- 25 in Arian controversy. Arianism continues to affect church into 4<sup>th</sup> century and even in WEST when
- 26 EASTERN Bishops sent missionaries to Germanic tribes
- 27 Emperor Julian the Apostate (361-363): Constantine died, political turmoil, then Emp Julian's family
- 28 murdered for political reasons he believed were done by the Christians (Julian doesn't forget). He is
- 29 elected Emperor by army of the WEST and becomes Emperor of Rome; tried to nullify his Christian
- 30 baptism; he restored many of pagan temples; attempted to start a church based on Catholic Church's
- 31 <u>hierarchy</u>; restored status of Orthodox bishops who followed Arianism; referred to Jesus as *pale*
- 32 Galilean; tried to rebuild Temple in Jerusalem to nullify Jesus' prediction that Temple would be
- destroyed (1st rebuild destroyed by earthquake; 2nd rebuild had balls of fire came from ground that
- burned workers, he stopped rebuild; dies in battle with Persians in 363 AD)
- 35 Edict of Thessalonica: issued February 27, 380 AD (20 yrs. after Emp Julian) that ordered all subjects of
- 36 the Roman Empire to profess the faith of the bishops of Rome and Alexandria, making the Nicene
- 37 Christianity the state religion of the Roman Empire. Catholicism becomes official and sole religion of
- 38 Roman Empire
- 39 2<sup>nd</sup> Ecumenical Council: Council of Constantinople (381)<sup>2</sup>: Emperor Theodosius called council to address
- 40 continued Arianism and new heresy: Macedonism (heresy that denied the divinity of Holy Spirit); Council
- 41 added Holy Spirit to the Creed.
- 42 Patriarchy of The Church: Disagreement about who was patriarchy of The Church: Constantinople,
- 43 Rome, Alexandria, Antioch, or Jerusalem? Increased tensions between EAST and WEST Church that leads
- 44 to *Great Schism* in 11<sup>th</sup> century and continuance of two halves of The Church.
- 45 St. Augustine<sup>4</sup> (354-430): lead immoral life away from The Church; his mother, St. Monica prayed
- 46 constantly for his conversion; St. Ambrose, Bishop of Milan helped Augustine to return to the faith.
- 47 Augustine becomes Bishop of Hippo in North Africa (395); very influential, considered bridge between
- 48 old (Roman) world and new (Catholic) world; schooled in Roman ways, history, and philosophy; wrote
- 49 about his spiritual life in autobiography in Confessions, discusses living life separate from Christ and
- 50 embracing the faith.

- 51 City of God: Written by St. Augustine to answer question about what happened in Rome in 410 AD
- 52 (sacked by Germanic barbarians over non-recognition of their efforts on part of Empire destruction of
- Rome blamed on Christians); <u>City of Man</u> is based on *self-love* but <u>City of God</u> is based on *love of God*
- 54 and self-lessness and faith is the KEY to world history; cannot discard faith and think it has no bearing
- 55 on the world; we have to know our faith to understand the history of the world
- 56 Other Heresies St Augustine fought:
- 57 **Donatism:** Validity of Sacrament depends on worthiness of minister; no clemency for those who lapsed
- 58 (Defense: God through His grace has chosen this man to be conduit to confer grace on us through
- 59 celebration of the sacraments; gives explanation of sacramental theology)
- 60 **Pelagianism:** Denied Original Sin (was a personal sin); Denied necessity of Grace (Jesus did not need to
- 61 do anything for us to restore relationship with God) (Defense: Augustine gives fuller understanding of
- 62 Jesus's mission, role of God's grace, how grace operates in our lives, provides solid theological
- 63 foundation)

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- 64 <u>3rd Ecumenical Council of Ephesus</u> (431 1 yr. after Augustine died; shortest council on record 1 day;
- 65 200 Bishops attended): addresses heresy out of EAST by Nestoria (Bishop of Constantinople, 428) -
- 66 Nestorianism: 1. God came down and took fleshy human garment Christ was two persons: one divine,
- one human. Emperor is Theodosius II called council, Pope St. Celestine I, Bishop Cyril of Alexandria
- 68 confirmed belief that Jesus was one person, two natures one human, one divine. 2. Mary was not
- 69 mother of God: We confess the holy virgin to be the Mother of God because God the Word took flesh and
- 70 became man from his very conception united himself the temple, he took from her." Council of Ephesus.
- 71 People danced in the street chanting, Holy Mary, Mother of God.
- 72 4<sup>th</sup> Ecumenical Council of Chalcedon (451): Affirms two canons:
  - 1. Jesus is fully human and fully divine.
  - 2. Constantinople is equal in authority to Rome.
  - **Pope St. Leo the Great I (440-461):** called *great* because
  - **1.** Effectively dealt with heresy of Monothelitism *one nature;* Christ has only one will, human nature
- absorbed by divine nature; Jesus was not human, is TRUE GOD but not true man; writes letter to
  Patriarch of Constantinople (**Tome of Pope St Leo**<sup>4</sup>) DEFENSE: Jesus came, felt emotion, felt need to eat,
- 79 was tempted by this world but difference is that His *human nature* never gave in to those temptations.
- 80 Emperor Marcian called Council (#4) of Chalcedon. 600 Bishops attended, with full approval of Pope St
- 81 Leo the Great affirmed Jesus possessed two natures, fully human and fully divine (hypostatic union).
- **2.** Defended Rome against Atilla the Hun (450) from sacking the city and later in **455**, convinced the
- Vandal King Genseric to loot the city but not destroy or burn it. They took the **Great Menorah**<sup>3</sup> which
- has never been seen again.
- 85 Fall of Roman Empire (476): German chieftains have set up Emperors for last 20 yrs. and the last one of
- the WEST was only 16 yrs. old, Romulus Augustulus (475-476)(grandson o Leo I and son of final Emperor
- 87 Zeno) and was forced to resign by German chieftain Odoacer who called himself King. He recognized lax
- authority of EASTERN Emperor Zeno until he was perceived as a threat and was eventually killed by a
- 89 rival, Theodoric the Great (King of Ostrogotha)
- 90 With total collapse of Roman Empire in 491, The Church fills vacuum of authority and gives some
- 91 administrative order to continue to carry on WESTERN Civilization.
- 92 Conversion of the Franks: King Clovis of Franks married Clotilde, a Bulgarian Princess and a Catholic. She
- 93 converts her husband, and the citizens follow. France has been called the eldest daughter of the Church.

- 97 from the ground and **breathed into his nostrils the breath of life and man became a living soul.**
- 98 <sup>2</sup> 2<sup>nd</sup> Ecumenical Council: condemned Arianism, Macedonism; added Holy Spirit to the Creed 150
- 99 bishops in attendance; upheld decisions of Nicaea regarding Arianism, condemned Macedonism (heresy

- denying the divinity of the Holy Spirit; proclaimed Holy Spirit Third Person of the Trinity equal to the Father and the Son. Pope St Damascus did not know about council but *centuries later* was accepted as ecumenical council.
- 103 <u>Wikipedia.com</u> Seven canons, four of these doctrinal canons and three disciplinary canons, are
   104 attributed to the council and accepted by both the EASTERN Orthodox Church and the ORIENTAL
- Orthodox Churches; the Roman Catholic Church accepts only the first four because only the first four
- appear in the oldest copies and there is evidence that the last three were later additions. The third
- canon reads: The Bishop of Constantinople, however, shall have the prerogative of honor after
- the Bishop of Rome because Constantinople is New Rome.
- 109 <sup>3</sup> The Great Menorah: In Jewish tradition, the menorah, with its treelike form and ornamentation, is
- often associated with the burning bush as well as the tree of life. And these are associated with the
- presence of the Lord (or the Shechinah, the fiery pillar and cloud of His presence; see Bible Dictionary,
- "Shechinah"). According to scholars, the Menorah was lost forever when either the Visigoths sacked
- Rome in 410 CE/AD, or the Vandals in 455 CE/AD. Many conflicting legends arose as to its fate during
- the chaotic centuries that followed.

- 118 The GREAT SCHISM OF 1054 AD
- On July 16, 1054, Patriarch of Constantinople Michael Cerularius was excommunicated from the
- 120 Christian church based in Rome, Italy. Cerularius's excommunication was a breaking point in long-rising
- tensions between the Roman church based in Rome and the Byzantine church based in Constantinople
- 122 (now called Istanbul). The resulting split divided the European Christian church into two major branches:
- 1. the WESTERN Roman Catholic Church and the 2. EASTERN Orthodox Church. This split is known as
- the Great Schism, or sometimes the "East-West Schism" or the "Schism of 1054."
- 125 The Great Schism came about due to a complex mix of religious disagreements and political conflicts.
- 126 One of the many religious disagreements between the WESTERN (Roman) and EASTERN (Byzantine)
- branches of the church had to do with whether or not it was acceptable to use unleavened bread for
- the sacrament of communion. (The WEST supported the practice, while the EAST did not.) Other objects
- 129 of religious dispute include the exact wording of the Nicene Creed and the WESTERN belief that clerics
- should remain celibate. These religious disagreements were made worse by a variety of
- political conflicts, particularly regarding the power of Rome. Rome believed that the pope—the religious
- leader of the WESTERN church—should have authority over the patriarch—the religious authority of the
- 133 EASTERN church. Constantinople disagreed. Each church recognized their own leaders, and when the
- 134 WESTERN church eventually excommunicated Michael Cerularius and the entire EASTERN church. The
- 135 EASTERN church retaliated by excommunicating the Roman pope Leo III and the Roman church with
- him. While the two churches have never reunited, over a thousand years after their split, the WESTERN
- and EASTERN branches of Christianity came to more peaceable terms. In 1965, Pope Paul VI
- and Patriarch Athenagoras I lifted the longstanding mutual excommunication decrees made by their
- 139 respective churches. Today, the two branches of Christianity remain distinct expressions of a similar
- faith. Roman Catholicism is the single largest Christian denomination, with more than a billion followers
- around the world. EASTERN Orthodoxy is the second-largest Christian denomination, with more than
- 142 260 million followers. EASTERN Orthodoxy includes national churches, such as the Greek Orthodox
- 200 million followers. LASTERN Orthodoxy includes hadonal charcines, such as the Greek Orthodox

Based on the numbers of adherents, the <u>Eastern Orthodox Church</u> (also known as Eastern Orthodoxy) is the second largest <u>Christian communion</u> in the world, after the <u>Roman Catholic Church</u>, with the most common estimates of baptized members being approximately 220 million. The

numerous <u>Protestant</u> groups in the world, if taken all together, substantially outnumber the Eastern Orthodox, but they differ theologically and do not form a single communion.
