- 2 This amount of writing would have been impossible without the assistance of scribes who
- 3 attended him and were trained to transcribe words at the rate that they were spoken. Augustine's
- 4 achievement is even more startling when one realizes that his major works, as opposed to his
- 5 letters, were written at different sessions over a period of years. In other words, his longer works
- 6 often had been written in stages, and sometimes these stages were years apart. Over five million
- 7 words that Augustine wrote or preached are still available today, but not all of them have been
- 8 translated into English.
